The <Adopt a School in South Africa> project builds on an existing program in the country in which sandwiches are given out to students who come to school hungry due to lack of money at home. Hope Secondary will be helping a school in the area of Mdantsane at which there is currently no help of this kind. To give an idea of how little it takes to help, one Canadian dollar can provide a whole loaf of bread to the students."
