The Lieutenant Governor of B.C., Steven Point, visited HSS invited by his brother Mark Point, who is a teacher in our school. Steven Point is the first representative of the First Nations assigned this position. The event was organized mainly by the First Nations students in our school but some classes from Coquihalla and C.E. Barry schools also attended. Mr. Point explained to students his duties as a representative of the monarchy. He laughed about the Government House with 102 rooms where he resides with a swimming pool, a driver and so on which, however, remains the property of the people and everyone can visit it.

Steve Point said he works on promoting literacy and he added that much of BC 's population is below the standards for reading and writing. He encouraged the students to read books and to access his website and send stories about the pictures they find there.

He talked about the importance of being in each class, fully present and not dreaming about something else. He also talked about the importance of staying focused or alert each moment because with each action and decision you build your future.

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
